Café Church

For a year now, Café Church has been operating in Lochcarron. We've been continuously assessing, evaluating, and adjusting it based on feedback to make it as pleasant as possible for the existing congregation while creating a more aesthetically appealing environment for today's younger society, which we believe will join us one day. In all these developments we are very aware that we do not have adequate capacity to build and reach out. We do what we can trusting that God will honour our efforts. And we take encouragement in Genesis 7:5, where the Lord did not tell Noah that he had to go out and catch two of every animal to bring them into his Ark, rather he said to Noah what Kevin Costner says in the classic movie Field of Dreams "if you build it, they will come". And so our hope is built on nothing less.



Community Detox

Stevie Boyle from Living Hope Skye & Lochalsh and myself secured funding from the Highland Drug and Alcohol Partnership's Outcome Improvement Fund, to research local capacity for a faith-based community detox program in Skye & Lochalsh. There is a real need for detox facilities at the crucial entry phase of recovery, but we lack the proper resources to help people. The funding will enable Stevie and me to dedicate time to the project to identify if there is enough local capacity to deliver this project. We currently believe we need 8 Christians within any area looking to



provide this service. We recognise that no one church is likely to have this capacity so it will require different churches to work together in order to share the work. We will be connecting with every church sometime during the summer to ascertain interest. In the meantime please contact me via email if you're interested in this area of work or just praying for us. 'Healing for Hurting Hearts' & 'Stronger'

Anne MacLeod of the Free Church in Kyle has been collaborating with Jackie MacLennan (Parish Development Assistant in Strath & Sleat) and myself to develop pastoral care training that can help individuals become more confident in visiting. We decided to start with the Healing for Hurting Hearts course. Sarah from Gairloch parish delivered an online version during the pandemic and returned to lead the face-to-face sessions over two Saturdays in Kyle Free Church. The course was enjoyable, insightful, and highly relevant, allowing



various churches and denominations to come together in fellowship. Many attendees expressed an interest in more training, so we are planning to run the original course again on August 26th and September 9th, followed by the follow-on 'Stronger' course in October and November. COOL, Foodbank & Warm Lounge Cafe

In Lochcarron, the church has partnered with COOL to deliver and develop youth work, and we have recently developed collaborations with the Free Church, resulting in really encouraging experiences. We are also very fortunate to have had Jackie MacLennan provide locum youth work support at various events, her contributions to these have been invaluable in bringing much-needed energy and vibe.

In addition, Lochcarron has launched a foodbank and has opened a Warm Lounge Café on Saturdays, which has been well-received. Due to its success, they plan to continue this initiative every winter as a platform for various outreach and mission activities.

An Tobar and Ladies Network

A few weeks ago, we organised our second ladies' day, featuring Margo Cunningham, formerly of Pray for Scotland, as the main speaker, along with several workshops. As our legacy aim, we decided to develop An Tobar as a network and establish a Ladies'



Network to support one another across boundaries. The next event is a Movie and Meal Night, where we will watch the Christian film "War Room". Thanks to Atlas Arts cinema equipment we hope to be able to provide an authentic experience!
